

PART 1 (2-3 minutes in total)

Warmer (Personal information)

Interlocutor: *Good morning/afternoon. I'm and this is my colleague, who will be listening to you and taking notes.*

What is your name? Can I have your marking sheet?

There are THREE parts in the Speaking Test: some questions asking personal information, a monologue about two photographs, and an informal discussion with some questions related to this. Please do not worry if you are interrupted during the test.

Now, we'll start with Part 1. I'm going to ask you about your life.

Warmer questions

MUSIC

What kinds of music do you like and why?

Where do you usually listen to music and what kind of device do you listen to music on?

CELEBRATIONS

What is your favourite celebration? Why?

How do you usually celebrate your birthday?

SOCIAL MEDIA

How do you usually communicate with your friends and family?

What are some of the positive and negative aspects of social media?

HOME

Tell me about your house or flat. Who do you live with?

Tell me about your town. Why do you like living there?

CAREFUL!

Ask the candidate **3 to 4 of the warmer questions**. Do **not invent** your own questions. Candidates respond to the interlocutor.

(WHEN THE CANDIDATE FINISHES)

Thank you. Now we are going to do Part 2.

PART 2 (3 minutes)**Monologue about two photographs**

The candidate has to talk about two photographs for about 1 minute.

Interlocutor: (Candidate's name) your photographs show natural disasters. I'd like you to talk about them on your own for about one minute. Now you have 30 seconds to look at the pictures and then you can start.

Follow-up questions:

- What problems can these disasters cause?
- Have you seen disasters like these?
- How can people help disaster victims?

Ask a **maximum of 2 of these back-up questions**. Do not invent your own.

Thank you. Now we'll move on to Part 3.



PART 3**Informal discussion and follow-up questions (3-4 minutes)**

Interlocutor: *In this part of the test, we will have a discussion together for about 4 minutes.*

Imagine you have a friend coming to visit our city: here are some ideas of what you can do together. Discuss all of them and choose the best three. You have 30 seconds to look at the pictures before we start.

Follow-up questions (2-3 minutes)

Interlocutor: *Now I'm going to ask you some questions related to our discussion in Part 3.*

B1

Where could you take a visitor outside your city?

What do you do when you visit a new city?

Do you prefer to travel with friends or family? What are the differences?

B2

How has mass tourism changed over the years?

Do you prefer package trips, or do you like to organize your own holidays?

What are the benefits of international tourism? Are there any disadvantages?

Why is ecotourism becoming more popular?

CAREFUL!

Ask a **maximum of 4 of these follow-up questions** to the candidate. Do **not invent** your own.

Bringing the speaking test to an end.

Interlocutor: *Thank you very much (candidate's name). That's the end of the Speaking Test.*

You have a friend coming to visit your city. Here are some ideas of what you can do together. Discuss all of them and choose the best three. You have 30 seconds to look at the pictures before we start.
